







Today, we are going to think about another way of spelling the 'or' sound:

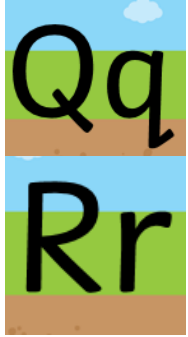

Spelling

A **prefix** is a group of letters that is added to the **START** of a word to make a new word. Today, we are going to think about adding the **-un prefix**.

When **-un** is added to the start of adjectives, it means 'not':

unkind = not kind

unhappy = not happy

When **-un** is added to the start of verbs, it means the reverse of that action:


unzip = undo the zip

unused = not been used
