1. Can you underline all the verbs in this paragraph? I have done the first three for you.

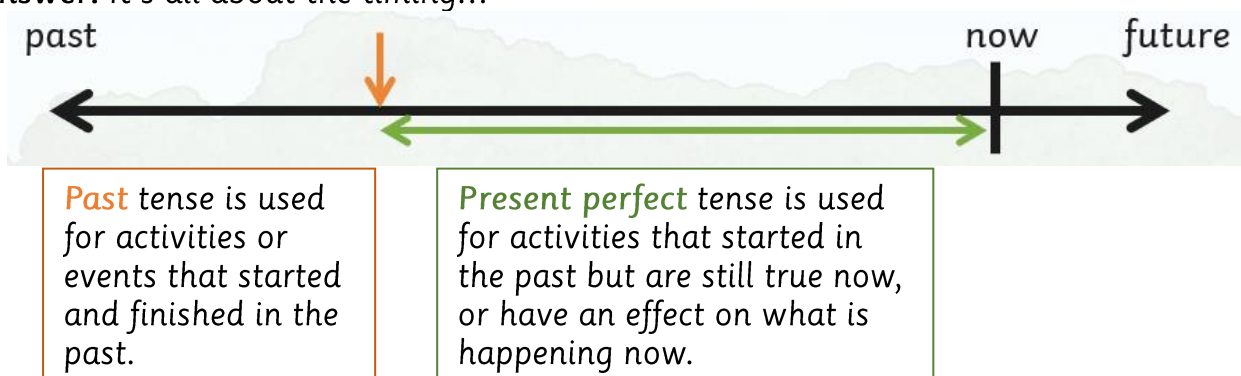
