#### Word 1

- It has six letters
- The second, fourth and fifth letters are vowels
- It starts with the sixth letter of the alphabet

#### Word 2

- It has nine letters
- The first, third, sixth and eighth letters are consonants
- It starts with the same letter as Word 1
- It ends with 'ite'
- It means liking something more than other things

# Write a List Poem

What magical things would you like to find in your rucksack when you go exploring?

- ★ Choose unusual things to add to your bag. Be as inventive as you can e.g. a hat made of stars, boots made of spider webs!
- ★ Exaggerate things make them the biggest, the tallest, the sweetest, the fastest.
- ★ Invent new things e.g. a Soupee bird, the smell of clouds.
- $\star$  Challenge: Try to make your items sound exciting by using alliteration when words start with the same sound e.g. <u>sizzling sun, lazy lion, towering trees.</u>
- ★ Challenge: Use precise, powerful verbs that show things in a more exciting way e.g. scorching, splashing, glittering.

Now put all of your ideas together to write your poem like the explorer's. Look at the tips below first:

- You could give your poem a title like 10 Things in an Explorer's Rucksack
- Your poem should have ten lines put each of your ideas above on a new line
- In a poem, each line starts with a capital letter but the line ends with a comma to show that the whole poem hasn't finished yet
- Use a full stop at the end of the tenth line

Usually, poems are written in the middle of the page instead of starting at the left side of the page — it's very tricky to do but give it a go!
