- Add detail to your sentences by using conjunctions like **and** or **but**.
  - Challenge: Use a **time conjunction** instead.
- Use **fronted adverbials** at the start of some sentences to tell us **when** something happened. Use a comma after the fronted adverbial
- Add explanation to your sentences using a conjunction like **because**.
  - Challenge: Use a different **cause conjunction** instead.
- When you have finished, read your work to check that it flows and makes sense.
- Challenge: Use different sentence starters to make your writing more interesting. The suggestions below will help you:

### Sentence Starter Ideas

**Verb:** *Skipping*, she made her way up the path.

**Adjective:** Stunned, the shark retreated.

**Adverb:** Carefully, she made her way through the hall.

**Place preposition:** *At the roundabout*, he turned left.

**Time preposition:** In the afternoon, we finished our school work.

**Simile:** As cool as ice, she left the room.
