Let's start with a spelling challenge — can you figure out the missing letters to make one of your spelling words?

<u>Using a or an</u>

Remember that we use **a** or **an** before a **singular noun** (when there is only one object). If the noun starts with a **consonant** sound we use **a** before it (*example*: **a** lion) and if the noun starts with a **vowel sound**, we use **an** before it (*example*: **an** elephant). Remember that it's the <u>first sound</u> in the noun that you must think about, not how the noun is spelt.


Popcorn Game




