Challenge: How will you build suspense (use the tips below)?

- Let the threat get closer and closer
- Show the character's feelings through their reactions. Example: She froze
- Include short, punchy sentences
- Use rhetorical questions to make the reader worried. *Example:* Who had turned out the light?
- Use empty words to hide the threat. Examples: something, somebody, it, a silhouette
- Use powerful verbs. Examples: crept, grabbed, smothered
- Use dramatic connectives. Examples: in an instant, without warning, out of the blue
