Now, we are going to write a paragraph describing the villain by turning your improved character profile into proper sentences. Here is my example using my character profile — I have used different colours for each part so you can see where I got my information from.

Character Profile

Name: Wicked Wanda

Age: 362

Lives in: A stinky cave filled with bats.

Appearance: Shrieking voice, greasy hair, blotchy skin, stoops over because she is so old.

Personality: Suspicious of everyone, envious of kind people.

Crimes: Tears out the hearts of every kind child in the world. Mixes them in her cauldron to make a kindness soup. Eats the soup every night but it doesn't make her any kinder.

Special powers: Can fly on a broom. Freezes adults so she can tear out the hearts of their kind children.

Magic tools: Flying broom, wand that freezes people, cauldron that can fit a neverending amount of kind hearts into it.

Fears or weaknesses: Fears being hated by everyone because of her unkindness.

Wicked Wanda is 362 years old which makes her the oldest witch in the world. She lives far, far away in a dark, stinky cave filled with bats who are her only friends. When she opens her mouth, only a shrieking sound comes out which brings horror to anyone who hears it. Her blotchy skin, greasy hair and stooping posture are an awful sight so I hope you never have to meet her. Over the years, the wicked witch has become suspicious of everyone and especially envious of kind people as she is so cruel herself. What makes her truly evil is that, each night, she leaves her cave to hunt down the kindest children that she can. Once she has found these innocent children sleeping in their beds, she tears out their hearts and swoops back home on her broomstick. Sometimes, the children's parents wake up to find Wicked Wanda in their house but she has a way of dealing with them – she freezes them in place with her wand. Once she is back in her cave, the witch makes a disgusting heart soup in her never-ending cauldron and she gobbles it down every night. She hopes that the soup will make her kinder, as her biggest fear is that her unkindness will make her hated by everyone, but every night it fails.

Did you spot that I used some skills which we all know like fronted adverbials, conjunctions, three clauses in a sentence and apostrophes for possession?

Now it's your turn to write a description of your villain! The easiest way of starting is with the villain's name, age and where they live then move on to their appearance and the other information.

Challenge									
Make sure that you use apostrophes for possession correctly. Example:									
The cauldron belonging to the witch> The witch's cauldron.									
Remember that if a noun is plural (more than one) and ends with an s , we just add the apostrophe to the end of the word . Example:									
The cats belonging to the witches> The witches' cats.									
If the noun is plural and does not end with s , we add 's to the end . Example:									
The hearts belonging to the children> The children's hearts.
