

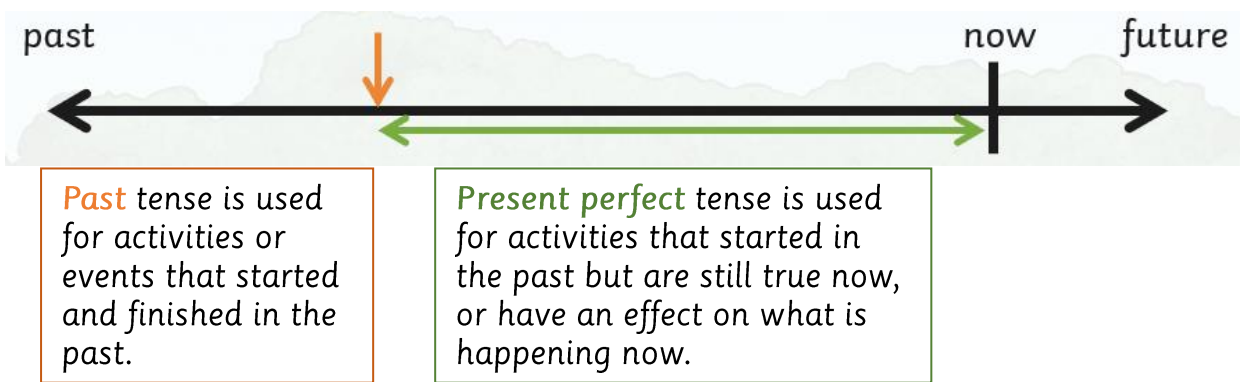

Present Perfect Form of Verbs

Let's start with a spelling challenge. Write the spelling word into the correct spelling shape. Count the number of letters and think about ascender and descender letters.

Do you remember looking at the **present perfect form of verbs** a couple of weeks ago? We're going to practise that again.



When we are writing in the present perfect tense, we use **has**, **have** or **have not** before the main **past tense verb**.

has or have + past tense verb

1. Look at these two sentences. The first one is written in the past tense and the second is written in the present perfect tense.

The aliens **sneaked** into the cinema.

The aliens **have sneaked** into the cinema.

What does the first sentence tell us?

What does the second sentence tell us?

2. Match the sentence which uses the verb in the **past tense** to the sentence which uses the same verb in the **present perfect tense**.

Mum sold her house.	I have arrived at the football stadium.
I arrived at the football stadium.	She has kicked the ball out of sight.
Kim decorated her whole house.	The men have chatted since the start of the day.
The men talked since the start of the day.	Mum has sold her house.
She kicked the ball out of sight.	Kim has decorated her whole house.

3. These sentences have been written in the present perfect tense. Can you circle the **past participle of the main verb** (think about which version sounds as if it is still happening)?

- My hair **has** really **grown** / **grew** recently, hasn't it?
- Look how much work you **have** **did** / **done** today!
- Dad didn't put the washing out because it **has** **been** / **was** raining all day.
- Mum, Josh **has** **came** / **come** over so can I go out to play for a bit?
- Oh no, I **have** **forgot** / **forgotten** my homework book!
- The teacher **has** **blown** / **blew** her whistle for the end of playtime.
- Shh! The film **has** **began** / **begun** already.
- Would you like to see the portrait I **have** **drew** / **drawn** of you?

4. Can you change these sentences into the present perfect tense? Remember these rules:

Use **has** if the sentence is about he, she or it.
Example: My friend Kashaan **has** **lived** in this town for five years.

Use **have** or **have** if the sentence is about I, you, we or they.
Example: When you **have** **eaten** your dinner, you can go and play.

- The aliens **landed** on the planet Zigtog.
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- My dad **was** looking for his wallet all day.
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- Heidi blew out half of the candles on her birthday cake.
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- The fans **lost** all hope.

Can you re-write these sentences so that they start with a **place preposition**? I have given you an example.
