

<p>Leaflets Letter writing (informal register) Newspaper reports Poetry</p>	<p>A relative clause is one kind of dependent clause. It has a subject and a verb but can't stand alone as a sentence. Often, relative clauses can be embedded within a main clause, usually marked by commas. They are embedded using the relative pronouns: who, whose, which, where and when.</p> <p>'That' is the only relative pronoun that cannot form an embedded relative clause, as it is grammatically incorrect to use a comma before it.</p>	<p>Spell words with endings: -tial</p> <p>Spell words using verb prefixes: dis-, de-, mis-, over-, re-</p> <p>Spell words with endings: -ant, -ance</p>

<p>Text: Windrush Child, by Benjamin Zephaniah. Windrush Child is about a boy called Leonard who arrives in Britain from Jamaica in 1945. The text, set in south London, follows his story of integration, interrogation and social prejudice.</p> <div style="text-align: center; margin-top: 20px;">  </div>	<p>A subordinate clause is another dependent clause that does not make sense without the main clause; its function is to add additional information. This clause can be used at the start or end of a sentence. It is marked by coordinating conjunctions: since, as, when, while, although, after, before, until and because.</p> <p>Parenthesis – a word, phrase, or clause inserted into a sentence to add extra, subordinate or clarifying information.</p> <p>Build cohesion within and across paragraphs by using transitional phrases and adverbials of time to show how a relationship between ideas logically connects sentences and paragraphs.</p> <p>Reporting phrases used in speech, e.g., Leonard said, <i>"I travelled from Jamaica to Britain."</i></p>	<p>Embedded relative clause E.g., Migrants from the Caribbean, who left their loved ones behind, wanted to help rebuild Britain.</p> <p>Relative clause E.g., Air raid shelters that housed Windrush migrants were not adequate.</p> <p>Parenthesis E.g., Use of commas - Migrants from the Caribbean, islands like Jamaica and Trinidad, moved to rebuild Britain. E.g., Use of brackets - Migrants from the Caribbean (Jamaica and Trinidad) moved to rebuild Britain. E.g., Use of a hyphen in informal writing – I was born in Kingston, Jamaica – a sunny part of the world.</p>
